Introduction

The Highland Community Planning Partnership is committed to challenging Violence Against Women at both local and national levels. Violence Against Women is an issue that affects many women - between 1 in 5 and 1 in 2 women in Highland will experience at least one form of gender based violence in her lifetime.

The effects Violence Against Women can have on those who experience it are wide ranging and it may impact on physical, emotional and/or sexual health. There are also impacts on children who are living with domestic abuse; who are sexually abused, or whose carers experience gender based violence.

We are mindful that it is not only women who experience abuse and that such abuse is unacceptable no matter who experiences it or the circumstances in which it takes place.

Information about services who may be able to support those who have experienced gender based violence are included in this leaflet. Many of these organisations also have a presence on Facebook and Twitter.

Emergencies 999

Aims:

NHS Highland offers a variety of health services, more details are included over the next couple of pages.

Services Provided:

NHS 24 - is a 24 hour telephone health advice and information service. It provides information on health conditions and local NHS services, e.g. finding a pharmacist, GP surgery, dentist or Accident and Emergency department.

General Practitioners (GPs, Family Doctors) - services are available free of charge to everyone. If you are not registered with a GP you can still ask to be seen as a temporary resident.

Practice Nurses - will usually be able to document injuries and treat as appropriate. Emergency contraception is available from the practice nurse.

Accident and Emergency - Hospital A&E departments treat medical emergencies that are too urgent or serious for a GP to treat. You can make your own way there or call 999 for an ambulance.

Midwifery - A pregnant woman will be assigned a midwife, who will carry out routine checks.

Community Mental Health Services - are available for Psychiatric, Addiction and Learning Disability Services, enabling many people to receive support and care in their home locality and in non-institutional settings. If you have concerns about your mental health or depression, you can speak to your GP in the first instance.

NHS Highland (continued)

Community Care Services - A woman approaching social work is likely to be seen by a social worker from the Community Care Team, which works predominately with adults. The area teams can access residential care, day care and community support services.

Forensic Medical Service - If a serious assault has taken place, the police may arrange for you to see a Forensic Physician. Forensic Physicians are specially trained doctors whose first priority is to ensure that any health concerns or questions you may have are properly dealt with. The Forensic Physician may also offer to examine you thoroughly for injuries and take forensic samples which might help the police investigation. A female police officer will help the doctors to package samples and arrangements may be made to photograph certain injuries, with your permission.

Highland Sexual Health - provides a free, confidential one one-stop service. The nurses and doctors are specially trained in sexual health and contraception, and will provide advice in a sensitive way. Sexual health services provide two types of clinic; Genito-Urinary Medicine (GUM) and contraception. GUM clinics provide services such as testing and treatment for sexually transmitted infections (STI); free condom supplies; pregnancy testing and emergency contraception; and counselling and testing for HIV.

Aims:

The objectives of North 25 are protecting, promoting and preserving the sexual and reproductive health of young people by educating them in matters relating to sexual behaviour, contraception, sexually transmitted infections and unwanted pregnancy.

Services Provided:

Young persons' (under 25 years old) counselling and contraceptive and sexual health services. Online, text and telephone information services. Information and education via leaflets, training materials, information sessions. Medical and counselling services at clinics include counselling around sexuality, sexual orientation, relationships, sex, sexual health, and pregnancy. Oral, inject-able, Implant, intra-uterine contraceptives provided, along with condoms and lubricant, Chlamydia testing and treatment. Pregnancy testing and counselling.

We are dedicated to providing a victim-centred approach, ensuring that anyone who engages with the police receives the support and protection they deserve, especially when faced with the trauma of Domestic Abuse and Sexual Crimes.

Our response when dealing with perpetrators will be swift and decisive. Action will be taken to target perpetrators and place them before the courts.

When we respond to Domestic Abuse this will be done in a sensitive and proportionate manner, also assisting you to make contact with support services who can best meet your needs. Victim safety is paramount and we therefore look at safety planning to assist you to be safe and supported.

Specialist investigators called Sexual Offences Liaison Officers (SOLO) are appointed to victims of sexual crimes. These officers are specially trained and will explain the police process to you and act as your single point of contact within Police Scotland.

They are also able to provide you with details of other services you may wish to access in order to get support.

Police Scotland will respond to all Domestic and Sexual crimes as a matter of priority. SOLO support is available 24/7 across the Highlands & Islands area.

- To work towards the prevention and ultimately the elimination of sexual violence, supporting social change by raising awareness and understanding of rape and sexual violence, challenging myths and campaigning.
- To work with others to improve the way society, organisations and agencies respond to survivors of sexual violence.

Services Provided:

RASASH provides person centred and trauma informed support, information and advocacy for anyone, aged 13 or over, who lives in the Highland Council area and who has experienced sexual violence or abuse. We are based in Inverness and can provide face to face support for anyone able to come to our premises, or who lives within 30 minutes' drive time of Inverness. Over time, and as funding allows, we aim to develop a presence across the whole of the Highland Council area. At present we can provide support by telephone, email and Skype to survivors and their families who cannot travel to Inverness and live more than 30 minutes distant of Inverness.

Aims:

We offer a number of statutory services to people in Highland including, Housing, Education, Health and Social Care and Service Points. Contact details for all services in all areas across Highland are available on our website at **www.highland.gov.uk** or by calling our service centre.

Services Provided:

Housing - People experiencing abuse can contact their nearest Housing Officer for advice on homelessness, housing and housing support. The Council has a legal duty to help homeless people and is committed to preventing homelessness. If you are homeless or threatened with homelessness you should contact your nearest Housing Office immediately to get help, advice, and to complete a homeless application form, if necessary.

Care & Learning - has responsibilities to prevent Violence Against Women by educating young people about its causes and consequences. School staff are also able to provide support to children and young people affected by domestic abuse and other forms of gender based violence.

Family teams support families with children - Early Years (Health Visitors and Early Years workers), School age (School Nurses and Children's Service Workers) and Care and Protection.

Criminal Justice teams offer programmes to perpetrators.
